## GHISLAINE VIÑAS DESIGNER

Born in the Netherlands and raised in South Africa, Ghislaine began her design journey studying interior design at Philadelphia University.

After graduating and moving to New York City, she started out designing commercial office spaces and later established her firm in 1999 when commissioned to do a complete build out of a 9,000 sq-ft office and art gallery in the Starrett Lehigh Building in New York's Chelsea art district. Since then the studio has completed many residential, commercial and hospitality projects ranging from apartments, townhouses, lofts, offices and even a coffee shop in New York City, to offices and homes in Los Angeles, New Jersey, South Carolina, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Florida (Miami, West Palm Beach & Hobe Sound).

Holding Pattern: Mimicking the idea of being stuck in a behavioral loop, Holding Pattern features a series of shapes with shifting tones that are bisected by linear elements. The color customization possibilities are endless in this digital print.

**Tangled Up:** A vertically focused, rotogravure-printed design, Tangled Up has lines that ripple and tangle in a playful tribute to getting in trouble. This minimalist ode to stripes honors this staple that has been in the Wolf-Gordon archive for decades.



Vicious Circle: Concentric circles are intersected by bold lines in this dynamic pattern, another rotogravure wallcovering. Like the name implies, Vicious Circle creates a relationship between the circular and linear that draws the eye back and forth.


